	Developing the Report	Communicating the Findings
1.	Develop consensus among stakeholders regarding key findings/recommendations	Develop a communications plan
2.	Determine the format/structure of the report	Prepare communications materials to suit the needs of all stakeholders and decision-makers
3.	Write the report and any other communication	Use materials to inform stakeholders/decision-makers

^{*}Note: Reporting can occur during earlier stages of the HIA process and include various types of meetings and interim reports

What Makes a Good Report?



- Includes executive summary
- Summarizes process for each HIA step
- Shows how proposal is linked to health determinants and health outcomes (e.g health determinant pathways)
- Discusses evidence, data sources, methods used and existing conditions for each health issue analyzed
- Presents characterization of impacts
- Shows how findings relate to recommendations



What Makes a Good Report?



- Provides specific recommendations for decision alternatives, policies, mitigations
- Includes input from stakeholders
- Is accessible to multiple audiences



Know Your Audience, Know Your Message

- What issues and values are most important to this audience?
- What might they be concerned about that you can address in your message?
- What action do you want your audience to take?

HIA Values in Reporting



HIA Value	Examples In Reporting Practice
Democracy	Involve stakeholders in explaining findings
Equity	Remember your audience – have versions relevant to your most vulnerable i.e. in other languages and at 8 th grade reading level
Sustainable Development	Explain key short-term and long term take-aways
Ethical Use of Evidence	Explain how you arrived at your data and recommendations – your sources and who was involved, how recommendations are feasible, your limitations, communicate through all stages of HIA
Comprehensive Approach to Health	Help audiences understand broad health determinants -what they are, how this policy and HIA relates



HIA Process Evaluation

Evaluate:

- Did you use HIA minimum elements or full practice standards?
- Did you address health equity?
- How well did you manage the process?
- How well did you engage stakeholders?
- What was the impact of the HIA process on building capacity for your organization and stakeholders









HIA Impact Evaluation

Evaluate:

- Impact of the HIA on the outcome of the decision
- Impact on the decision making process
- Other impacts of conducting the HIA (i.e. other projects, grants)









HIA Monitoring Evaluation

Monitor/Evaluate:

- Monitor implementation of recommendations
- Changes to health determinants
- Monitoring health and environmental outcomes over time









Monitoring...

- Monitoring/ Health Management Plans
- Identify indicators for health determinants and outcomes
- Identifying parties responsible for plan and recommendation implementation
- Identify actions for addressing noncompliance and adverse outcomes









VIII. Monitoring Plan

The Kohala Center will seek additional funding to track and document actions taken by agricultural and health industry stakeholders, agricultural and educational administrators as well as county and state legislators that support HIA recommendations. This would determine:

- What policies have changed/been enacted?
- How have activities and policies increased production and purchase of local food at the commercial, home, and institutional levels?
- What evidence is there for changes in individual, family, and community health as a result of HIA recommended actions?
